1. Definitions

In this scheme:

“the charity” means the charity identified at the beginning of this scheme.

“the will” means the will of Harold Cornelius Cardew-Rendle of 20 January 1989.

2. Administration

The charity is to be administered in accordance with this scheme. This scheme replaces the former trusts of the charity.

3. Name of the charity

The name of the charity is The Cardew-Rendle Legacy.

4. Object of the charity

The object of the charity is to advance the education of the public in the history of Cornwall and the Stannaries by:

- (1) holding competitions and awarding prizes in accordance with the provisions of this scheme; and
- (2) subject thereto, such other means as the trustees think fit.

5. Trustees

The trustees will be the persons who are the trustees from time to time of The Royal institution of Cornwall acting in accordance with their usual procedures.

6. Competitions and prizes

- (1) Once every two years the trustees shall hold an essay competition to be called the “Cardew-Rendle Cornish History Essay Prize”.
- (2) The trustees shall be at liberty to prescribe the subject (providing it relates to the history of Cornwall and the Stannaries); and the trustees shall consider:
 - (a) at least once in every five turns, whether to prescribe a subject involving one or more aspects of the military history of Cornwall and the Stannaries; and
 - (b) at least once in every ten turns, whether to prescribe a subject relating to the descent and ancestry of Dr Cornelius Cardew;providing, in each case, that the trustees are satisfied that such subject matter will advance education for the public benefit.
- (3) The trustees may, if they so wish, hold such other competitions and award such other prizes as they think fit.

- (4) All competitions shall be open to any member of the public.
- (5) In respect of each competition, subject to the trustees being satisfied that at least one entry is of sufficiently high standard:
 - (a) they may select a winner;
 - (b) they may award a prize to the winner;
 - (c) they must arrange for any winning essay or research results to be publicised, the extent and nature of such publicity to be decided by the trustees.

7. Rules and regulations

- (1) The trustees may from time to time make rules and regulations for holding the competitions and awarding the prizes including, but not limited to:
 - (a) the nature of, and terms to be applied to, the prizes; (this may, at the trustees' discretion, involve bursaries or other arrangements by which further study or academic work may be funded, as well as cash or other payments);
 - (b) the value of the prizes and other associated fees and financial arrangements;
 - (c) the publicity to be given to the competition; and
 - (d) how the entries are to be judged.
- (2) In doing so, the trustees shall have regard to the wishes of Harold Cornelius Cardew-Rendle as set out in the Will, but shall not be bound by the terms of the Will, in respect of which the terms of this Scheme shall prevail.

8. Use of income and capital

- (1) The trustees must firstly apply:
 - (a) the charity's income; and
 - (b) if the trustees think fit, expendable endowment; and
 - (c) when the expenditure can properly be charged to it, its permanent endowment

in meeting the proper costs of administering the charity and of managing its assets.
- (2) After payment of these costs, the trustees must apply the remaining income in furthering the object of the charity.
- (3) The trustees may also apply for the object of the charity:

- (a) expendable endowment; and
- (b) permanent endowment, but only on such terms for the replacement of the amount spent as the Commission may approve by order in advance.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

9. Questions relating to the Scheme

The Commission may decide any question put to it concerning:

- (1) the interpretation of this scheme; or
- (2) the propriety or validity of anything done or intended to be done under it.
